EAS320Y1Y/EAS1303Y1Y Modern Standard Japanese III

I. Objectives of the Course

This is a lower intermediate level language course, which is designed for those who have learned Japanese for two years in an academic institution and/or who have passed N4 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test and/or the A2 level of Common European Framework of Reference for Languages: Learning, Teaching, Assessment (CEFR). Students must have completed EAS220Y1Y/EAS221H1S in the 2023-2024 academic year with a final grade of B- (70%) or better, or have passed the June-July or the August 2024 placement interview and the test in order to take this course. A strong foundation in beginners' level grammar and wide knowledge of vocabulary with approximately 400 basic kanji is required.

This course aims at the strong development of the four skills in modern Japanese; speaking, listening comprehension, reading and writing. The emphasis is on appropriate communication in Japanese, both in spoken and written, to the given contexts. By the end of this course, students should expect to be able to read and write long and complex passages, as well as recognize and use more kanji vocabulary in context, and to engage in both formal and casual conversations in various situations. The students will also become familiar with a wide range of aspects of modern Japanese society and culture.

In this course, communicative aspects of the language are emphasized so that the students will be able to function in Japanese. Therefore, all the classes will be conducted in an interactive manner; students are encouraged to interact with the instructor and their peers in class. Active participation in class is strongly encouraged and highly evaluated.

Students with diverse learning styles and needs are welcome in this course. V. Grading

Your final grade will be determined based on the following:

1. Homework Assignments (23% = 0.5% each x 46)

There will be two or three homework assignments every week:

- One of them is on paper, which you must submit in person at the beginning of class.
- The other(s) must be submitted on Quercus.
- Due Date: Every Tuesday, at 1 p.m.
- · Late Submissions:
 - o Late assignments will only be accepted until 1 p.m. of the next class day following the due date.
 - You may do so with a reasonable reason up to THREE TIMES and the fourth late assignment will not be accepted towards your final grade.
- E-mail Submissions:
 - Assignments sent by e-mail are accepted only under certain conditions, and you need to receive prior permission to do so.
- Grading:
 - O You will receive full marks if you complete and submit the assignment on time.
 - o If your performance is unsatisfactory, you may need to re-submit your work within a given period. Successful resubmission in a timely manner will result in a full mark.

2. Quizzes 小テスト (15%=1% each x 15)

The purpose of the quizzes is to encourage review of learned material and to assess your progress.

- For each "Unit" in "J-PEAK", there will be two quizzes: one focusing on vocabulary and the other on grammar.
- For each "Lesson" in "日本語生中継", there will be one quiz.

Important Notes:

- Quizzes are typically administered at the beginning of class on Thursdays.
- No make-up quizzes will be provided if you are absent or late for class. There will be no exceptions.
- Leaving class right after taking a quiz is not accepted and the quiz score will not be recorded for the final grade.

3. Practice Presentations (8% = 1.6% each x 5)

There will be a practice presentation assigned in each "Unit" of "J-PEAK", either to individuals or groups. You will receive full marks if you complete your presentation on the assigned dates.

4. Final Presentation (8%)

In the winter term, students will participate in a formal presentation to showcase their achievements from throughout the year. Students can choose to perform individually or as part of a group, with the decision made at the start of the winter term. Individual presentations must be four minutes long, while group presentations will vary in length based on the total number of group members. All students will present in class on Thursday, April 3, 2025. The grading criteria will be provided when details are given in the winter term.

5. Oral Tests (16% = 8% each x 2)

At the end of each term, there will be an oral test. Students are required to both present individually and engage in role-plays with the instructor. The test content will be based on the materials from "J-PEAK" and "日本語生中継"

6. Term Test (15%)

A two-hour term test will be held in-person during the December Final Exam Period. The exact date will be announced. It is a written test including listening comprehension components.

7. Final Examination (15%)

The two-hour final examination will be administered in-person by the Faculty of Arts and Science during the April Final Exam Period. The exact date will be announced. It is a written test including listening comprehension components.

N.B.
